Building on Rock or Sand

Stories to Be Shaped by--part 4

Matthew 7:21-29 April 17, 2016

DAY 1: Is it enough to say the right things?

1. Over and over again in the Sermon on the Mount Jesus lays out one of two choices: two kinds of righteousness, two kinds of devotion, two treasures, two masters and two different ambitions.

2. Though our secular world views Jesus as the "loving" Jesus, they should read the Sermon on the Mount again. Over and over again, Jesus insists there are <u>only</u> two roads, not many!

3. Jesus ends this message clearly defining what His road is and isn't. There are two catastrophic "counterfeits" to real Christian faith.

* Just a verbal profession of the faith.

* Just an intellectual knowledge about the faith.

Matthew 7:21 "Not everyone who says to me, `Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven."

Matthew 7:22 On that day many will say to me, `Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?'"

DAY 2: The necessity of doing!

Matthew 7:21 "Not everyone who says to me, `Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven."

3. As you can plainly see, the problem was not their theology. The problem was that that was *all* there was to it. Their beliefs had not affected their moral choices and their actions.

Matthew 7:22 "On that day many will say to me, `Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?'"

4. What's fascinating is their response. Instead of responding to their failure in doing the will of God, to what do they appeal in Matt. 7:22?

Matthew 7:23 "And then will I declare to them, `I never knew you; depart from me, you evildoers.'"

5. Jesus ignores their excuses. He then points to two more reasons they have missed heaven. What are they?

6. In spite of their appeal to their (1) theology (yesterday's study) and (2) ministry actions, they have not dealt with their:

- a. Central problem--their sin

DAY 3: Building a foundation on rock

1. In our first two studies, counterfeit Christianity was "saying" the right things without "doing" the right things. The next two days' counterfeit Christianity is "hearing" the right things without "doing" the right things.

Matthew 7:24 "Everyone then who <u>hears these words</u> of mine and <u>does them</u> will be like a wise man who built his house upon the rock; 25... and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat upon that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock."

Matthew 7:26 "And everyone who <u>hears these words</u> of mine and <u>does not do them</u> will be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand; 27...and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell; and great was the fall of it."

2. What's similar in the two stories?

3. What's contrasted in the two stories?

4. Imagine two men each building their own house under ideal conditions: no rain, waves, storm, floods--crystal clear weather. Draw a picture of each man's house **prior** to the storms and floods Jesus predicts will come:

House built on a rock	House built on sand	

3. If no storm comes, to the casual observer is there any **visible** difference to the two houses?

4. Jesus' point is not the construction of the houses. It is the construction of the foundation!

5. In a parallel account, notice the added detail regarding the foundation...

Luke 6:48 ... he is like a man building a house, who dug deep, and laid the foundation upon rock; and when a flood arose, the stream broke against that house, and could not shake it, because it had been well built.

6. What parallels strike you about someone who **does** God's word, and building a foundation in your life that can withstand the storms of life?

DAY 4: Building on the sand

Matthew 7:24 "Everyone then who <u>hears these words</u> of mine and <u>does them</u> will be like a wise man who built his house upon the rock; 25... and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat upon that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on the rock."

Matthew 7:26 "And everyone who <u>hears these words</u> of mine and <u>does not do them</u> will be like a foolish man who built his house upon the sand; 27...and the rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell; and great was the fall of it."

1. No one could tell the difference in the two houses until the tsunami hit! Now, draw the two houses AFTER the rain, floods and wind hit them:

2. The point of the story is the failure of hearing God's word without putting it into practice.

3. Let's look at a few parallel verses to illustrate further what keeps us from doing God's word.

James 1:22 But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves.

²³ For if anyone is a hearer of the word and not a doer, he is like a man who observes his natural face in a mirror;

²⁴ for he observes himself and goes away and at once forgets what he was like.

²⁵ But he who looks into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and perseveres, being no hearer that forgets but a doer that acts, he shall be blessed in his doing.

Ezekiel 33:30 "As for you, son of man, your people who talk together about you by the walls and at the doors of the houses, say to one another, each to his brother, `Come, and hear what the word is that comes forth from the LORD.'

³¹ And they come to you as people come, and they sit before you as my people, and they hear what you say but they will not do it; for with their lips they show much love, but their heart is set on their gain.

³² And, lo, you are to them like one who sings love songs with a beautiful voice and plays well on an instrument, for they hear what you say, but they will not do it.

DAY 5: The authority of Jesus over your life

1. Well, after three chapters of Matthew, and now twenty-two weeks for us, the Sermon on the Mount ends. Let's look at the immediate aftermath!

Matthew 7:28 And when Jesus finished these sayings, the crowds were astonished at his teaching,

²⁹ for he taught them as one who had authority, and not as their scribes.

2. Today's secular response to Jesus, and even much religious response is to sugar-coat the words of Jesus, to just take the parts they like--the "meek and mild" Jesus.

3. After having actually *studied* the Sermon on the Mount, one should be struck with anything but the wishy-washy, milquetoast Jesus who "just wants everybody to get along."

4. Over and over again, Jesus lays down two choices, and only two. Either you're living on God's road or your living on the Self road. Either God is driving your life or you are. Those are the most basic and fundamental choices of life. The effects of each should not be surprising.

5. The immediate response of the thousands of people who heard the Sermon on the Mount was awe at His **<u>authority</u>**! Let's look at two additional verses, below.

John 7:16 So Jesus answered them, "My teaching is not mine, but his who sent me..."

7. We will understand the authority of the words of Jesus only on the condition of our willingness to do what He teaches!

John 7:17 "... if any man's will is to do his will, he shall know whether the teaching is from God or whether I am speaking on my own authority."

8. Mankind's approach to the bible is: "I'll read it and if I agree with it or like it, I'll do it."

How does that square with how Jesus says we should be, in John 7:17?
