2 Samuel 24:18 On that day Gad went to David and said to him, Go up and build an altar to the LORD on the threshing floor of Araunah the Jebusite." So David went up, as the LORD had commanded through Gad.

²⁰ When Araunah looked and saw the king and his men coming toward him, he went out and bowed down before the king with his face to the ground. ²¹ Araunah said, Why has my lord the king come to his servant?"

To buy your threshing floor, "David answered, so I can build an altar to the LORD, that the plague on the people may be stopped."

- ²² Araunah said to David, Let my lord the king take whatever pleases him and offer it up. Here are oxen for the burnt offering, and here are threshing sledges and ox yokes for the wood. ²³ O king, Araunah gives all this to the king. "Araunah also said to him, May the LORD your God accept you."
- ²⁴ But the king replied to Araunah, No, I insist on paying you for it. I will not sacrifice to the LORD my God burnt offerings that cost me nothing. 'So David bought the threshing floor and the oxen and paid fifty shekels of silver for them.

²⁵ David built an altar to the LORD there and sacrificed burnt offerings and fellowship offerings. Then the <u>LORD answered prayer</u> in behalf of the land, and the plague on Israel was stopped.

² So the king said to Joab and the army commanders with him, Go throughout the tribes of Israel from Dan to Beersheba and enroll the fighting men, so that I may know how many there are."

- 2 Samuel 24:10 David was conscience-stricken after he had counted the fighting men, and he said to the LORD, I have sinned greatly in what I have done. Now, O LORD, I beg you, take away the guilt of your servant. I have done a very foolish thing."
- 2 Samuel 24:12 Go and tell David, 'This is what the LORD says: I am giving you three options. Choose one of them for me to carry out against you." So Gad went to David and said to him, Shall there come upon you three years of famine in your land? Or three months of fleeing from your enemies while they pursue you? Or three days of plague in your land?"
- The hands of the LORD, for his mercy is great; but do not let me fall into the hands of men." So the LORD sent a plague on Israel from that morning until the end of the time designated, and seventy thousand of the people from Dan to Beersheba died.
