How God Uses Money In Our Lives

How does God use money in our lives? We think of money in terms of assets to spend. God thinks of it as a tool to shape. He shapes our purpose, meaning, character, behavior, relationships, values, and our heart, etc.

DAY 1: The unintended consequences of "mine".

Psalms 24:1 The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it; ² for he founded it upon the seas and established it upon the waters.

DAY 3: Accountability and motivation

Matthew 25:19 "After a long time the <u>master</u> of those servants returned and <u>settled accounts</u> with them.

- 1. What did the owner do when he returned from his journey?
- 2. What strikes you about their interchange? How would you describe their relationship?
- 3. One day, God will "settle accounts" with you. We are "accountable" for how we use the resources God entrusts to us. Why is being accountable a good thing? What benefits can you think of?
- 4. Accountability is an extrinsic motivator. It is a motivation that comes from <u>outside</u> of us. <u>Intrinsic</u> motivation comes from within. Do you sense an intrinsic motivation by the servant who received five talents? What does the servant <u>want</u> to do?
- 5. You will be held accountable for how you invested the resources God entrusted to you.
- a. How can the idea of <u>outward</u> accountability help you invest God's resources wisely?
- b. How can the idea of <u>inward</u> motivation help you invest God's resources wisely? Jot down your thoughts next to any of the following which strikes a chord with you:

- * Sense that you did what was right?

DAY 4: Rewards!

- 3. What was the response of the master to both men? (vv.21, 23) Was there any difference in his response? How does that strike you?
- 4. Someday, God could say those very words to you! What do you need to do this week to move in the direction of better stewardship of God's resources entrusted to you? Are there any action items to better invest His resources?

DAY 5: Excuses and blame

Matthew 25:24 "Then the man who had received the one talent came. 'Master,' he said, 'I knew that you are a hard man, harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed.

- 1. What did the third servant do with the owner's talents entrusted to him? (v.25)
- 2. Why? The third servant reveals his thinking! He accuses his master of being unscrupulous, unjust, and uncaring. Since the "master" represents God in this parable, we conclude that the third servant's assessments of his master are wrong. They are an indictment on him! List his "reasons" for NOT investing the talents?

- 3. Jesus puts his fingers on two other issues. What are they? (v.26)
- 4. What consequences befell the third servant? (28-30)
- 5. This is serious stuff. What do you need to make a priority regarding your stewardship of God's talents to you?

²⁵ So I was afraid and went out and hid your talent in the ground. See, here is what belongs to you.'

²⁶ "His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed?
